Farmer's Market Coming

The numbers are in from Council Member Kathy Graziano's poll, and the results are clear. People overwhelmingly want a farm market in our area. In response, it looks likely that we will have a farm market in operation this year.

The South of the James market, as it will be called, will bring the same expertise and contacts that have made the Byrd House farm market a success.

The market is scheduled for Saturday mornings, from 8 to noon, and will start the first week in May. It will be located at the end of New Kent Avenue and 42nd Street, at Shelter 2 in Forest Hill Park.

It is estimated more than a dozen vendors of fresh, locally grown produce will be participating, including Amy Hicks from Amy's Garden, and Carol the flower lady from the Byrd House and the Thursday 17th Street Market. In addition. some growers who participate in Community Supported Agriculture will use the market as a delivery point for community partners.

The market is not associated with the city government. The vendor is renting space from the Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities. Although it has not been announced, it is understood that Fourth District Council Member Kathy Graziano paid for the rental space with personal funds.

Erin Freeman, Associate Conductor of the Richmond Symphony, commuted from Baltimore for two years before deciding on Richmond as a permanent home. She feels strongly about "being a part of the community" where the Symphony plays. So when it came time to move here she did her research and chose Forest Hill.

She and her husband Drew, a database consultant for non-profit organizations, loved the natural setting of the neighborhood, closeness to downtown and the architectural diversity. High on their list of "must-haves" according to Erin was being able to walk to restaurants, shops and a coffee shop.

They have recently completed a three-month kitchen renovation to their home on 41st St, including a new screened porch off the kitchen. Erin made the project both beautiful, with stunning black granite countertops, (you can view the kitchen on this fall's house tour) and cost effective – finding deals on appliances using the internet and coupons!

Erin's dual roles with the Symphony as the Associate Conductor and as the Director of the 130-voice Richmond Symphony Chorus keep her grounded in two musical worlds.

The Kicked Back Classics series offer the public a chance to hear the Symphony practice at various venues throughout the City including the Manchester Music Exchange. Erin and Drew are both aficionados of Tae Kwon Do. Erin has reached the black stripe level, and Drew is a black belt teaching at VCU and the James Center YMCA. And while the martial arts are not something you might expect out of a symphonic conductor, Erin says they "help you be a better teacher and have more patience."

She says Tae Kwon Do helps her remember how difficult it was to learn something new and different. She tries to remember that when she needs to teach a young musician something new.

When she is not busy with the Symphony, Erin looks forward to time spent in the garden and in her new kitchen whipping up batches of homemade granola. She and Drew are exploring the many bike trails in and around Forest Hill Park and James River Park.

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Various Projects in Works Along Forest Hill Ave Corridor

There has been considerable activity regarding development in our area. Most of these projects are positive, however, others will require us to work aggressively against them to maintain the character of the area and to continue the revitalization of Forest Hill Avenue. Below are quick updates on several projects.

The Stony Point Shopping Center (Huguenot Road and Forest Hill Avenue) has requested permission to erect a sign on Huguenot Road to allow great visibility for the shops in the center.

In other news at the Shopping Center, a work-out facility (gym) recently opened. At this point, most of the space at the Center has been leased.

CVS (Forest Hill Avenue, next to Food Lion) is in dis-

cussions to build a free-standing unit at near Hathaway Road and Forest Hill Avenue. Look for movement on this in the next couple of months.

Rite-Aid is under contract (but has yet to approve the purchase) to build a freestanding unit at the intersection of Cherokee Road and Forest Hill Avenue. In addition to the old Citgo site, the developer is also under contract for the land behind the service station. They are tentatively proposing (if approved by Rite-Aid) to build the pharmacy and several dozen units of "affordable" housing. Since a Community Unit Plan will be needed, the neighborhoods will have an opportunity to comment on this.

DILLIGAF Tattoo & Piercing has purchased the old dry cleaner store at the intersection of Cherokee Road and Forest Hill Avenue, and they plan to move the tattoo shop to this highly visible location.

Given that this is a "by right" business, no special use permit is needed. Therefore, the community will have little opportunity to comment on the move.

It is somewhat discouraging that after spending years working to revitalize the Forest Hill Avenue corridor, this high-traffic, highly-visible location will be home to a tattoo parlor. The shop is currently in a less visible location in the Stratford Hills Shopping Center.

When they first arrived in the area, many folks tried to see what, if anything, could be done to encourage the owners to at least change the name, which is an old biker's term that is offensive to many. Unfortunately, zoning regulations at the time allowed for the use and name. **Tropical Smoothie Cafe** is currently in contract discussions with the center near the Wawa (Forest Hill Avenue, where AT&T and Little Caesar's is located) to open a Cafe in the center. Most agree that this would be positive for the area.

Wendy's (Forest Hill Avenue, in front of the Wal-Mart and Lowe's) abruptly closed for business a few weeks ago.

The Arbors Senior Apartment and Community complex is now open and seeking tenants. The former building was destroyed by a fire, and the new building will have better fire suppression and other safety features.

The rebuilding of this complex was long overdue and it is a great sign that they finally are accepting new residents.

5. Help to get the support of civic associations, business leaders, parents, and other tax payers.

Park Sign Restores Historic Gateway

A new sign stands proudly above the brick columns at the historic entrance to Forest Hill Park. For Friends of Forest Hill Park, it is a dream fulfilled, and one more piece of the puzzle as they work to restore the park to its former glory.

When FFHP began researching the park's history many years ago in the Valentine Richmond History Center archives, they found a photograph from around 1890 that showed a man standing by the trolley tracks at the Forest Hill Amusement Park entrance on Forest Hill Avenue.

According to neighborhood legend, some time in the 1940s, during World War II, the iron letters were taken down as scrap iron "for the war effort" and the stucco columns were converted to brick structures. Fast forward to 2006, when the Forest Hill Neighborhood Association sponsored its first annual House Tour. A wish list of donations was drawn up, and neighbors voted to give some of the house tour proceeds to Friends of Forest Hill Park, to restore the missing sign.

Some \$3500 was pledged for the sign with additional funds to be spent on other park improvements.

Last summer, a less than accurate sign reproduction was installed, but was later rejected in favor of greater historical accuracy.

Thanks to the expert eye and typographic skills of admitted "type-font junkie" Matt Boyle at Acorn Sign Graphics, the letters on the new sign precisely match the ones in the original historic photo. (PS: Matt is a Westover Hills resident)

Custom Ornamental Iron, located in Glen Allen, was kind enough to redo the sign at no extra charge, meticulously fabricating it according to Acorn's digital specifications.

If you get a chance, stop by and see for yourself what a difference a grand entrance can make to a beloved old neighborhood hangout.

hood Association voted at its February meeting to join with Springhill and Woodland Heights in opposing this amended development plan fearing increased traffic problems, safety issues, and inadequate parking.

Crosland withdrew the amended SUP on March 7. Woodland Heights and Springhill had engaged a lawyer to look into legal issues about the extension of the original SUP.

When Crosland met with the representatives from the three southside neighborhoods on March 10, Crosland already had submitted the new SUP before any negotiations with the neighborhoods. The Land Use Committee had directed Crosland and the neighborhoods to try to work out their differences before the next meeting of the Land Use Committee on

March 18. The new SUP still calls for 200 rental units, minimum size 650 square feet.

The only two topics settled on March 10 were that (1) the parcel at 600 Cowardin will no longer be attached to the project at 700 Cowardin and (2) 700 Cowardin will be rental property.

Attempts to negotiate density at a March 20 meeting between Crosland and neighborhood representatives did not result in an agreement. The two parties are still very far apart on what each finds to be acceptable. It is expected that Council could vote on this SUP as early as Tuesday, May 27.

City Council's numerous postponements and the City Land Use Committee's directive that Crosland, the developer, and the representatives from the neighborhoods continue to negotiate may be much ado about nothing. Crosland seems reluctant to make any concessions on the issues most important to the neighborhoods—density and rentals.

Residents are encouraged to stay informed on this issue.

The land proposed for development is a "gateway" to South Richmond and could set a precedent for future multi-family developments along Cowardin and Semmes Avenue.


<u>Sunday Excursion</u> Take a Trolley Car and Follow Original Route on April 6 Tour

Donald McEachin, 9th District State Senator General Assembly Update



As the 2008 General Assembly ends, I would like to share with you some of my highs and

lows in my first Session as your State Senator.

I was dismayed to see my low-level nuclear waste disposal study dropped by the House of Delegates. Concurring with my concerns that we have no plan for our low level nuclear waste when South Carolina stops accepting it in July, the State Senate unanimously approved a study. Unfortunately, the House of Delegates used the tyranny of the majority to prevent discussion or a vote on the measure.

My worry remains that we have no plan and the time quickly approaches when Virginia will need to dispose of its own radioactive trash.

I also introduced a bill to ensure that high school students are exposed to information about FDA-approved contraceptives in a strong abstinence-based Family Life Education program. The Senate narrowly rejected this bill. While abstinence is the best choice for our youth and we must stress that in our schools, we all know that sometimes our adolescents don't listen. Therefore, it is imperative that high schoolers have the information they need to stay and be safe.

My Higher Education Student Loan Act has passed the House and Senate and awaits the governor' signature. This will ensure transparency in the financial aid business, forcing lenders and higher education institutions to disclose important information to students about the lenders and their relationship with the university. This is an important step in making higher education accessible and affordable for all students who want it.

Citizen Environmental Boards survived an attempt to weaken them and, thereby, weaken oversight of our environment. We were also able to institute several other environmental measures. I am eager to continue to advocate for these critical improvements.

Bird Count in Park Reveals Diversity

On Saturday morning, February 16, as part of this year's "Great Backyard Bird Count" (sponsored annually by the Cornell University Ornithology Lab), Richmond Audubon Society member Sue Ridd led a group of 10 interested visitors through Forest Hill Park.

Ms Ridd describes the park's habitat as "deciduous woodlands and urban freshwater," which translates to an excellent place to visit or live for more than 30 different bird species.

During the 2 ½ hours they walked through the park, the bird-count team recorded the following array: Mallard 2; Turkey Vulture 3; Red-tailed Hawk 2; Ring-billed Gull 2; Mourning Dove 2; Red-bellied Woodpecker 4; Yellow-bellied Sapsucker 1; Downy Woodpecker 2; Northern Flicker 1; Eastern Phoebe 2 (confirmed); Blue Jay 6; American Crow 3; Carolina Chickadee 2: Tufted Titmouse 2: White-breasted Nuthatch 2; Brown Creeper 1; Carolina Wren 3; Goldencrowned Kinglet 4; Rubycrowned Kinglet 1; Eastern Bluebird 2; American Robin 13; European Starling 1; Pine Warbler 2 (confirmed); Eastern Towhee 2; American Tree Sparrow 6; Song Sparrow 2; White-throated Sparrow 3; Dark-eyed Junco 50; Northern Cardinal 4; Red-winged Blackbird 4; Common Grackle 33; House Finch 2; American Goldfinch 4; House Sparrow 1.

If you want to sample the natural riches of Forest Hill Park, take the time to walk quietly through the park (keeping your dog on its leash) in the early morning or late afternoon. You may be surprised to see how many different birds are there for the very same reason!

Hazardous Waste Disposal Facility Now Open Regularly

The bucket of used motor oil in the garage now has someplace else to go. Richmond launched a year-round disposal of hazardous wastes eliminating the need for city residents to wait for a once-ayear collection. The measure initially created and funded by Council Members Chris Hilbert and Kathy Graziano. was first proposed almost three years ago, but delayed by the Department of Public Works. City public works officials opened the facility in March to collect hazardous waste at the East Richmond Road Landfill & Convenience Center, 3800 E. Richmond Road.

The kinds of waste accepted include solvents, such as paints and fuel; car fluids and batteries; household cleaners and drain openers; herbicides and pesticides; and thermometers and other devices containing mercury. Such waste is considered unsafe for landfills.

The year round collection is the culmination of a three year-long campaign by City Council Member Kathy Graziano, who has added money to the city budget, only to see the program deferred for several years.

James River Park Celebrates Earth Day on April 19

The Earth Day/14th Street Fish Festival will take place on Saturday, April 19, from 10-3 at the new Floodwall Park located at the south end of the Mayo Bridge.

Activities related to the river include: touch tanks with live fish, fishing rods, tackle, bait and guide service for kids, fly-fishing clinics and equipment demos for adults, girls dancing the migration of spawning fish (this is particularly interesting and takes place after lunch), opportunities to release fish into the river and canal, and bus tours to the Bosher Dam Fish Ladder.

There will also be a host of exhibits on energy efficient housing, low energy lighting, urban organic gardening and recycling.

There is lots of free parking and the event is accessible by the city bus line.
