Popular Farmers Market will Stay Open Until the End of November

The South of the James Market at Forest Hill Park has been extended through the end of November.

The market was originally to end for the season in October. But an agreement reached between the Market Manager and the Department of Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities will allow the market to remain open for an additional month.

The Market is also planning a special one-day holiday opening in December. The exact date and time will be announced later. Although ownership of the apartment building at 1207-1209 W. 47th Street has changed several times over the years, illicit activities have increased in severity, culminating in an all-night raid by the Richmond SWAT team and police department on July 2, 2008.

In addition to the illegal activities, the general condition of both the interior and exterior of the building have deteriorated. In early July several city and state agencies, including Community Assisted Public Safety, (CAPS), Richmond Behavioral Health Authority, and the Commonwealth's Attorney performed continued on Page 7

Play it Safe When Leaving Town

When you are leaving your home for a vacation, a visit to relatives, or just to get away from town for awhile, you should take a few precautions to make it look like there is someone in your house. Obviously you'll lock the doors and turn off the iron, but have you done everything possible to make your home safe? Criminals are observant and will look for clues that you are not home. For example, a burglar will notice if your newspapers pile up in the yard or whether your mailbox is overflowing.

You may be in a hurry to escape, but it's worth it to spend a few extra moments protecting your home and peace of mind before you leave. Here's a sample checklist for you to consider:

- 1. Stop newspaper deliveries. It's so easy to stop your delivery; you can even donate your newspapers or extend your subscription period!
- 2. Stop mail delivery. The postal service will hold your mail while you're away. Don't give criminals an extra opportunity to steal your mail, credit card applications, or tax return checks. The postal service will gladly hold your mail while you're away. Contact your local postal office and fill out a form, or visit https://holdmail.usps.com/duns/HoldMail.jsp.
- 3. Notify the Richmond Police Department that you're on vacation. Patrol officers will drive by your home and make sure everything appears safe! You can fill out a form at http://www.richmondgov.com/departments/police/HWBW.pdf or call Third Precinct at 646-1412. Remember, we live in Sector 312.
- 4. Plug in timers for lamps and radios. Timers are an inexpensive way to create the illusion that someone is home. Radios will liven up an otherwise silent house.
- 5. Ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your house while you're gone. Even better, give them a key to collect mail, newspapers, and flyers. Ask them to switch interior lights on and off
- 6. Let the police and your neighbors know how to get in touch with you in case of an emergency.

Even if you only leave for an extended weekend, think of the peace of mind you'll have knowing that your home is safer.

Private Security Scammers Falsely Claim Department of Justice Ties

Has a salesman from a private security company recently knocked on your door?

From personal experience and from those of my neighbors, some of the salesmen have used very aggressive sales tactics.

In fact, one salesman for APX went so far as to tell me that he worked for the Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS). This was in fact a lie, as DCJS is the state agency that merely regulates and issues licenses for private security companies doing business in the Commonwealth.

Interestingly enough, I recently discovered that other state agencies (Maryland, Nevada, Georgia, and Louisiana) have received complaints about APX, a company based

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
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The Wheels on the Bus Go Round and Round...

Buses lumber up and down Forest Hill and Westover all day. With high fuel costs and environmental worries, have you every thought about riding one? Where do you pay? What's the schedule like? Where do they go?

Betsy Shires, a psychiatric nurse at VCU Medical Center rides the bus to and from work everyday. Betsy lives on West 46th Street and gets on the bus at the corner of 46th and Forest Hill Avenue.

"It takes about 20 or 30 minutes to get to work," she says. "That's about the same time it would take me to drive, park, and walk from the parking lot to the hospital. While riding the bus, I get to read, look out the window, and just relax."

When she doesn't have a discount, Betsy pays \$1.25, saving gas, wear and tear on her car, and the cost of parking. She said the drivers are very helpful and take pride in their work.

The buses are handicapped accessible and have lifts for wheelchairs.

They generally run on time but are slowed down as all traffic is with auto accidents, road construction, and bad weather.

Betsy also finds taking the

bus downtown for big events, like the Folk Festival, saves time in traffic, looking for a parking spot, and a general hassle. "If you rode the bus once, you'd find out what a great convenience it is."

Bill Luebke, who works at the Library of Virginia, has been riding the bus to work for 30 years. Living on Forest Hill Avenue, he merely has to walk out his front door to board. He took the bus to save the expense of a second car when he and his wife first moved here.

"At that time," he said, "the buses ran every 10 minutes, now they are about 20 minutes apart. I have three choices, buses 63, 70, and 71. They take different routes to Forest Hill Avenue before going downtown."

Bill said he reads, visits with other passengers, and particularly enjoys looking out over the James River when they cross the bridge.

"The only drawback," he says, "is crossing Forest Hill Avenue when I get home." He gets off at 43rd Street and Forest Hill. There is a crosswalk there, but it is marked for a school crossing for Good Shepherd. "It can take me as long as five minutes to get across the street," he

remarked.

Betsy avoids that problem sometimes by taking bus 63. It takes longer, but puts her off on the south side of Forest Hill Avenue.

All your answers about riding the bus can be found at www.ridegrtc.com. The website explains such things as how to pay, what the schedules are, and the fares. You may also call customer service at 358-GRTC (4782) to find out the same information.

All local buses cost \$1.25 to ride, express buses are \$1.75 and if you are 65 or older you can ride for only 50 cents.

continued from Page 1 an inspection of the building. The property owners were issued a list of required repairs. The requested repairs concern the safety and health of the tenants. The owner was given until August 30, 2008 to have a plan in place to accomplish the repairs.

The good news is that there is strength in numbers and we are coming together as a community to face this situation. The Forest Hill Neighborhood Association (FHNA) has really gone to bat for us. FHNA has made numerous, helpful calls to many agencies to support our efforts. Through organized meetings, email and other contacts, we are moving toward a collective and permanent resolution. FHNA continues to support the community by facilitating the mediation with the property owner of Parkway Apartments.

On Tuesday, August 12, a meeting was held at the Forest Hill Presbyterian Church to allow homeowners an opportunity to address their concerns directly with the building's owner, and to begin to forge a path to a common solution. The tenants of the building also participated in the meeting and voiced their desire to live in decent housing free from criminal activity and to be welcomed by the neighborhood.

While the tension may have been thick we were able to conclude with a commitment from the owner to continue to remove problem tenants, make necessary repairs to the building, address the rodent and insect problem, the lack of landscaping, step up enforcement of leasing terms and be responsive to resident calls when problems arise.

While we realize we have not yet solved this issue, we are beginning to see that results can be realized and positive change can occur when we pull together and face these challenges as an organized and cohesive neighborhood.

I look forward to regaining a sense of trust in my community and knowing my neighbors better than before.
