Know Your Neighbor: Robin Cage - Art with Heart

One of our best known neighbors does not actually reside in the neighborhood, but spends most of her waking hours here. For the past 30 years, Robin Cage has been the owner and resident artist of the 43rd Street Gallery.

Robin was recently named a Virginia Master Artisan by the Artisans Center of Virginia (ACV). The award recognizes excellence in design and craftsmanship, and the mentoring, training and apprenticeship of young artists. The time-honored tradition of learning from a master craftsman is still alive in the potter's art.

"I studied as an apprentice for two years with John Friemarck and a year in Vermont," said Robin. And now she is passing that knowledge on, linking the past to the present, through her own students.

But it may come as a surprise to learn that such a gifted potter did not start out to be an artist. Originally from Halifax, Virginia, she grew up in a home where her father was an artist and sculptor, and she did "a little" art in high school. As an undergrad studying social sciences at The College of William

and Mary, her other activities included tennis, and there was no time to explore studio art classes. But all that changed.

"I was in graduate school in Ohio studying sociology when I saw a potter working at a wheel, and that was the start," said Robin.

Today Robin works exclusively in stoneware, a high-fired clay that creates beautiful, durable items. In her workshop in the back of the gallery, orderly rows of wheel-thrown mugs, bowls and plates are drying before being glazed and fired. Many of her design elements are influenced by nature. Trees, winged insects and birds appear frequently in the soft and earthy glaze on her pieces.

"Because I fire at cone 10 (2,300 degrees F) the color range is determined by the clay and the firing temperature. So you won't see any vibrant reds in my work," she said.

Since 1985, the gallery has been an important part of Robin's life. That's when the retail-zoned building that was formerly Uncle Earl's Trash and Treasure was up for sale. Part of the building was boarded up, the floor was shaky, and rain came in through the roof. After a lot of repair and rebuilding it became the 43rd Street Gallery, a potter's workshop, and a cornerstone of the neighborhood. For the past 20-some years, Jan Hampton's violin shop has been tucked away around the side of the gallery.

For Robin, having the ability to sell her work where she works, rather than selling exclusively at shows, gives structure and stability to her life. In addition to her pottery, the gallery features the varied work of 20 to 25 local artists, including several from the neighborhood. Robin produces items for sale in other galleries, does special orders, and teaches students at the shop. Approximately every six weeks she loads and fires up

For example, we have voted on significant issues such as continuing to support the South of the James Market location in the park, while voicing concern for the traffic impact on nearby neighbors. We have opposed certain city traffic and engineering plans for Forest Hill Avenue such as the proposed circle at Roanoke Avenue. Every year there are important issues to address as a neighborhood, and the FHNA is the best way to get our voices heard. Thanks to all of you who have joined the association, debated issues, and helped shape the positions that represent all of us. Join the FHNA so you too can vote on vital issues that concern us all.

One final plug for attending the meetings—we've got great guest speakers lined up! Tom Silvestri, the president and publisher of the *Richmond Times-Dispatch*, will join us on March 17, 2015 to talk about the importance of neighborhood newsletters and regional newspapers in today's digital age. In April, we'll enjoy a cooking demonstration (and samples!) from neighbor-owned Victory Farms, using fresh produce from their farm.

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A Message from Our Council Representative



Dear Neighbor,

I hope all is well! So far it's been an uneventful winter. I hope I didn't just jinx it.

The leaf collection this season has not been very good. I will continue to talk with DPW to see how we can do better. Their goal was to complete the first cycle in all areas the first week in February. Please let us know

if you have not had your leaves picked-up.

On a very exciting note, the NEW Huguenot High School opened in January. What a beautiful building!

While the gas main replacement in Forest Hill Avenue (from the Powhite Parkway east to Jahnke Road) is taking longer than expected, I do think they are making progress. We're hoping for completion in the spring. As soon as they are finished, Forest Hill Avenue will be paved.

I wanted to let you know, to our surprise, the City of Richmond's Department of Public Utilities (DPU) will be undertaking water main work in preparation for the Forest Hill Avenue Project (from Powhite Parkway to Hathaway Road) starting March 1, 2015. We were under the impression work would not be starting until spring 2016. Here is a statement from the Department of Public Utilities:

"Water main work will be performed on Forest Hill Ave. This will affect both eastbound and westbound traffic while the crossing is performed. Each intersection will take approximately 10-15 days. All signs will conform with V.D.O.T. specifications as jobs done on State Projects. Police will be on site to assist in

traffic control. This work will begin March 1, 2015 and will be done during normal business hours (9 a.m.-4 p.m.) weather permitting, and will take approximately two to three months to complete this stage of the project."

We will continue to pass on information as we get it. Don't hesitate to call with any questions.

South of the James Winter Market continues Saturdays from 9 a.m.-12 p.m. through April 25, 2015.

Real Estate Tax Relief for the elderly and disabled is available for Richmond residents who qualify. Applicants must be 65 years or older, or disabled at any age, property owner living at property, have a gross income of less than \$50,000 for 2014, and have a total net worth of less than \$200,000 (excludes the house and land they live in/on). Applications are being accepted until March 31, 2015 and can be accessed through the Department of Finance site at richmondgov.com/Finance/index.aspx, by calling 311, or my district office.

I invite you to call or stop by my district office at 6948 Forest Hill Avenue to share your ideas, concerns, and discuss issues. It's probably a good idea to call before you stop over. Your involvement with my office has and will continue to be vital to setting policy and providing services that improve our community and quality of life. I value your input. the shop's propane-powered kiln. She and two other potters built the large kiln which can hold 100-plus pieces at a time.

About the time that the gallery started, Robin and other local potters became aware of the Empty Bowls Project, an international grassroots effort to fight hunger. Potters and other craft people were holding fundraising soup dinners in which donors could take their bowls home as a reminder of all the empty bowls in the world. The local potters held an Empty Bowls event for the former Freedom House, and Robin said the organization was overwhelmed by the idea that someone would do that for them. That idea of supporting Freedom House meshed with the potters' desire to hold a small, well-juried show for local Richmond artists. The 43rd Street Festival was born.

In 1991 the first 43rd Street Festival was held in the parking lot of Good Shepherd with, as Robin described it, "a handful of artists, one food vendor, and a musician who played all day." Because Freedom House ceased operations a few years ago, the festival now benefits CARITAS, an organization that provides lasting solutions that help individuals and families break the

cycles of homelessness and addiction to reclaim their dignity.

Robin gratefully acknowledges Good Shepherd Episcopal School and the gallery's neighbors for their support for the festival over the past almost 24 years. Its impact has reached beyond art. "People have told me that they found the Forest Hill area because of the festival and moved here," she said.

Even after 30 years, Robin says she is not ready to retire. Few artists ever do!

"I hope to one day bring in a potter to take over the gallery. At least that's what I'm putting out to the universe for the next 10 years," she says. In the meantime, another load of pottery is ready for the kiln and the next festival to benefit the city's hungry and homeless is only seven months away.

"It's especially important to me to make something people use and treasure in a throwaway society; to feel real," says the potter, teacher, gallery owner, and benefit/festival organizer, who is still deep-down, a sociologist at heart.

We're the Thompsons—rescue dog adopters, child wranglers, once-in-awhile runners, and home renovators. We are on our third home restoration project in six years, the last two being right here in Forest Hill—a 1950s colonial brick beauty and a 1920s stucco American Four Square.

We moved into the brick beauty while expecting baby #1 and proceeded to paint, landscape, demo walls and remodel a kitchen all before Little-Miss-Dog-Tail-Puller could say, "Hammer." Not the easiest thing to do with an infant—note Willy's lack of hair. After all the blood, sweat and teething, we thought we might never leave our sweet home by the river. Yet somehow we found ourselves moving two years later to our current home...this time when Alexis was eight months pregnant with Little-Miss-Eardrum-Tester.

A well-loved home only four blocks away had the architectural character we had dreamed about. We jumped right to work. In our family, power tool lessons begin in utero. We sometimes wonder, "Should we post a 'pardon our dust' sign in the yard?" or "Should we tell the neighbors that we promise the deck will not remain unfinished forever?" But

overall, everyone has been lovely and we enjoy talking to all of the joggers, dogwalkers and farmersmarket shoppers as we pile HardiePlank in the backyard or refinish hand-me-down

furniture on the porch. We get many of the same questions, usually having to do with who our contractors are, or what projects we're working on. One couple even asked if they could come in and see the massive 10-foot by 14-foot, 1960s map of Richmond on our dining room wall (really, it's what sold us on the house).



I hope this opportunity inspires more volunteerism and community involvement by students of all ages!"

The annual scholarship is an award of \$500 presented to a graduating senior who lives in the Forest Hill neighborhood and who plans to attend college or a post-secondary institution. The selection process is based on an application; original answers to essay questions, including details and documentation of service to the community; a letter of recommendation from a non-

relative who knows the applicant and is familiar with his or her service to the community; and a copy of a letter of acceptance from the college the applicant plans to attend. Once awarded, the scholarship may be used for any college-related necessities.

The scholarship deadline this year is July 1, 2015. All materials must be postmarked by that date. The money will be awarded to the scholarship recipient by the FHNA during the August 2015 membership meeting. The selection committee will be determined every year and will consist of between three and five members of the FHNA executive board. The decision of the selection committee is final.
