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
Forest Hill 5K Returns! by Christine Waldron, FHNA Vice President

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Live Locally, Act Locally by Greg Somerville, FHNA President

efore moving to Forest Hill, I could have been the **D** poster child for political non-engagement. I voted in state and national elections, but did little else. I let other interests and priorities control my calendar. At my core, I felt I couldn't make a difference.

Recently I had a chance to talk with Kristen Nye, our 4th District Representative and President of the City Council. Since she's a neighbor, she let me drop by her house and chat about her political career. I was inspired to learn that her distinguished record of public service began with one small step of community engagement.

Kristen, how did you get involved in local government?

Before my son reached elementary school age, I stumbled upon information about plans for the Patrick Henry Charter School. I got involved and ended up on the Patrick Henry School Board. After confronting lots of misconceptions from city officials, I decided to put my name in the hat when a Richmond School Board seat opened in 2012. Though I had never run for – or had an interest in – public office, I won the election and served a 4-year term. In 2016, I decided to run for the 4th District seat on the City Council. I have been serving in that role for eight years.

What motivated you to move to Forest Hill?

Through my involvement with Patrick Henry, I came to love Forest Hill Park. The house we now live in allows us to walk our dog in the park every single day. We hear owls, we see turtles. This was one of the little oasis areas in our city. Shane and I are so lucky.

What's a specific issue that has been significantly influenced by Forest Hill neighbors?

Several years ago we initiated a traffic study on pedestrian infrastructure along Forest Hill Avenue, between Westover Hills Boulevard and 41st Street. Many neighbors pitched in, but Whit Clements (former FHNA President) played a major role. We walked down Forest Hill Avenue discussing specific safety concerns. Engineers can always study accident reports, but when neighbors point out the places where they can't cross the street with a child, it makes an impact.

The plan has not been fully implemented, but many pieces are in the queue that will make that corridor a lot safer. I'm really proud of the Forest Hill neighbors who advocated for this. Kristen (right) and her partner Shane



Until recently, I have been almost totally uninvolved in local government. What advice would you have for neighbors like me who might think they can't make a difference?

We spend lots of time thinking about whom we will elect for President or Congress, but our most powerful impact is felt locally. Is there a pothole on your street? Reach out to me. Does it seem minor? It could be impacting several other people. We need to be advocates for our streets, our neighborhoods, our district, and our city. 🛖

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Crooked Branch Trail will connect Crutchfield to 42nd Street

ore than 50 people turned out for an informational meeting on January 24th about the proposed Crooked Branch Trail and Bridge at the Stone House at Forest Hill Park.

The Crooked Branch Trail will connect Crutchfield Street to 42nd Street, with a bridge over Reedy Creek. The trail will connect Forest Hill Park to the James River Branch Trail that will run from Crutchfield south to Richmond Highway.

The bridge over the creek will be 103 feet long and 12 feet wide, and designed to clear a 100 year flood. The design of the bridge was described as akin to the bridge at Pumphouse Park.

The Crooked Branch Trail and the James River Branch Trail are both being funded by the American Rescue Plan Act, and as such the funds must be allocated by the end of 2024.

A few folks expressed concerns with how the trail construction and access would impact 42nd Street, as the dead end there is quite narrow. There were also voices in support of keeping the area as natural as possible. There seemed to be some apprehension about more cyclists and pedestrian traffic through the neighborhood.

Other attendees spoke in favor of making the park more accessible, of having more woods paths, and of having a safe place for children to ride bicycles.

The plan for the Crooked Branch Trail is slated to go before the Urban Design Committee in June. This meeting will be open to public comment.

Four ways to give unwanted items a second life locally

Donate to local thrift stores

Just a couple miles west on Forest Hill Ave, Stratford Hills is home to three thrift stores with a mission to serve the local community. Before donating, go online or call ahead to check each store's hours and whether they have restrictions on accepting certain items.

Furbish Thrift

Goodwill is a network of nonprofits that operate nationwide and help folks with job training and other supportive surfaces. Their new location opened up next to Publix in October 2023.

- Sell items online (cautiously!)
- Facebook Marketplace, NextDoor, and Craiglist are all examples of online platforms that can connect buyers and sellers in that live nearby. Users of these sites should be wary of fake accounts and attempts to steal personal infomation through these sites or messaging apps. Look up tips for safely selling items online before posting, and expect to receive dubious offers likely from bots.
- Gift items on the local Buy Nothing group
 - The Buy Nothing Project promotes the gifting economy, where real-life neighbors give and recieve items freely, without buying, selling or bartering. Forest Hill is part of the Buy Nothing South of the James Faceboook group, which also covers Springhill, Reedy Creek, Woodland Heights, Forest View, as well as parts of Woodland Heights, and Swansboro. Members of the group must live in one of these neighborhoods and need to answer several questions before being admitted. Learn more about it on Facebook and at buynothing project.org
- Participate in the Neighborhood Yardsale event on June 1st This year's Forest Hill Neighborhood Yardsale is set for Saturday June, 1st — the perfect time to cap-off spring-cleaning. The goal of this event is to have dozens of yardsales running simultaneously accross the Hills and Heights area. Households planning on hosting a yardsale should register ahead of time to be promoted by the Neighborhood Association. Last year's event had 20 participating addresses.

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ARTIST SPOTLIGHT Janet Lambdin Ringle

As long-time Forest Hill Flyer readers know, we've begun an ongoing series dedicated to shining a spotlight on the brilliant artists of Forest Hill. This is a new feature, so you can imagine how pleased we were to receive an email nominating Janet Lambdin Ringle for a profile.

Believe it or not, Janet was only 5 years old when her father entered one of her pieces into an art show. It not only took home an award but started off her lifelong journey as an artist.

A resident of Forest Hill since the mid-nineties, Janet says the inspiration she needs is all around her. From the river, nearby mountains and beaches to the incredible street art, galleries, and museums of Richmond, everything that sparks her imagination is right at her fingertips.

Though both of her parents were prolific artists (her father's murals adorned many DC restaurants) Janet was self taught. She finds working in a single medium restrictive to her artistic process, and prefers mixed media. Over the years she's experimented with a myriad of different styles and mediums and many of her pieces incorporate everything from acrylics, oil sticks and pastels to cold wax, encaustic and more.

She loves the freedom abstract work allows her and it's no coincidence that's what she's best known for. Like any artist though, her passions run deep. She also paints landscapes and would love to branch out into collage and even pursue a past love of sculpting soapstone.

Besides her amazing art, Janet dedicates her time to a few different art groups around the city. She was recently appointed president of the Metropolitan Richmond Artists Association and also belongs to a small collection of abstract artists known as the Abstraktors.

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Update from Council President Kristen Nye

Greetings, Forest Hill friends and neighbors!

I hope this message finds you enjoying a productive and balanced start to 2024! We have certainly hit the ground running very quickly at City Council and I know there are so many great initiatives happening right here in our neighborhood as well. As always, my office and I remain accessible to answer any questions and/or assist with any of your City services-related needs, but in the meantime, I'm happy to provide a few community-wide updates:

Forest Hill Lake maintenance: This is one of the most popular topics in the neighborhood and I'm happy to share that the lake is on track to be worked on this spring! Howard Glenn, who oversees this project with the Department of Public Utilities, provided a comprehensive update at the February 20th FHNA meeting – I'm very grateful that he took the time to share his expertise with the community and that DPU shares our collective commitment to the lake.

City Budget Season: We are in the thick of the City's annual budget process. As you may know, the Mayor drafts the budget and submits it to City Council – we then amend the budget as needed and then formally approve it. The Mayor will introduce his budget to Council in late March and then we will hold a number of public hearings on it over the ensuing two months. Throughout my time on Councill, I have said that I feel the budget is one of Council's most important responsibilities, so I will be sure to communicate about it with you regularly so you know how your City dollars are being spent.

Meals Tax Issues: I know many of you have seen reporting about the significant issues in the Finance

Department related to the collection of meals taxes. At our February 12th meeting, Council unanimously passed legislation to codify how certain meals tax payments are applied, which is the first in many steps to create a fair and transparent meals tax collection process. Richmond is a "foodie town" and we need to be doing everything we can to support our incredible restaurants, especially after many of them suffered so greatly during the pandemic. Please rest assured that Council cares deeply about our restaurants and is committed to ensuring we make the appropriate changes so they can continue to thrive.

Next District Meeting: My next District Meeting will be on Wednesday, March 20th from 6pm-7:30pm at Westover Hills Elementary School. The agenda is still in development, but please mark your calendars for some important discussions related to our district!

On a personal note, I wanted to share that I was honored earlier this year to be elected unanimously by my colleagues as President of City Council. I wouldn't be here without the support of the 4th District and I'm so thrilled to have even greater opportunities to amplify our incredible district. Thank you all for everything you're doing to make the 4th District such an incredible place to live – including bringing back the Forest Hill 5K and Forest Hill Spring Classic! I am honored to be a sponsor for both events and can't wait to cheer on all the participants!
